- Program studies a topic and writes the Every-member Material (research). Members who were part of that study volunteer to be experts at Unit meetings, to better facilitate discussion.

- Unit Leaders facilitate the Unit meetings and turn in question feedback to the Unit Chair.
- The Unit Chair summarizes feedback from all units and sends it back to Program for further action by the board or committee.

## WHAT UNITS WILL BE DOING ABOUT CHILD CARE AND RECALL

In January, League members will review all state and local positions. This review will determine whether we should maintain our existing positions, update them in light of new circumstances, create new positions, or eliminate those that are no longer relevant. Because advocacy can only be pursued based on the positions we hold, a rigorous process is followed before any new position is created or updated. Currently, two state positions are identified for potential updates: **Child Care and Recall**.

In November and December, League members will be asked to respond to consensus questions related to the Child Care and Recall studies. After gathering feedback from all Leagues across the state and members who aren't affiliated with local Leagues, Agreement Committees will analyze the responses to identify

areas of consensus and, potentially, formulate a new position based on this collective input. Since these studies are state-level, any final position will require approval from the state board, enabling the League to take action. Therefore, it is very important for members to engage fully and respond thoughtfully to the questions presented.

The EMM in November (Child Care) and December (Recall) will provide a summary of the studies and include the questions to be discussed during unit meetings. A link to the full study will also be made available to ensure all members are informed and prepared for the upcoming discussions. Your participation is vital as we work together to shape the future of our League's positions.

Our local outreach to educate voters has grown to include those living in shelters and those currently or recently incarcerated. The LWVOR Oregon Student Mock Election (OSME) has over 32,000 students registered through 43 middle and 75 high school educators from 21 counties around our state for the November 2024 election. Some Youth Council members have created mock election voting guides for their respective schools, such as Youth Council member Lily Yao at South Eugene High School.

**As we work toward a future of a more resilient and representative democracy, please consider leaving a legacy gift by adding the LWVLC to your will.** This will ensure that your commitment to defending democracy continues for generations.

**You can also designate a gift from your individual retirement account (IRA) to the League of Women Voters of Lane County to support our work now and into the future.** Individuals who are 70½ years old or older may take advantage of a simple way to

help our mission and receive tax benefits in return. The Qualified Charitable Deduction (QCD) reduces a person's gross income, which in turn reduces a person's taxable income and possibly a person's tax bracket.

You can give any amount up to \$100,000 annually from your IRA directly to a qualified charity. As a non-profit 501(C)3 organization, we are tax-exempt and will receive the total amount you designate from your IRA. Please check with your tax advisor or plan administrator for more information.

In certain conditions, QCDs also can count toward the [required minimum distributions \(RMDs\)](#) that people who are age 73 or older must meet each year if they have [traditional IRAs](#).

## CHANGE IN LUNCH COST

The League Board of Directors has decided that in order to cover the expenses associated with our monthly Speaker Series & Luncheon, the cost of lunch tickets has been increased to \$25. This still does not cover the full cost of the room rental, set up, food service and clean up, but increasing participant cost by \$5 will reduce the amount the League has to subsidize from the budget. Beverage and dessert only options will remain at \$5. Program only is no charge.

### BE WASTE-WISE BY TAKING PART IN OUR PLASTICS ROUND-UP

To promote our League's position on environmental protection and pollution control, bring in select recyclable plastics that would otherwise be headed for the landfill.

### For a LWVLC Plastics Collection Appointment:

Anyone who orders fruit will have access to a 10-minute appointment calendar. Look for more details on the LWVLC website and/or via email notification.

**No "Drop and Go."** All plastics will be screened and must be clean, dry, label-free as well as pre-sorted by codes #2, #4, or #5: #2 Tubs and Lids (Reminder: #2 bottles and jugs go in mixed curbside) #4 bottles, jugs, tubs and lids (most #4's are lids) #5 bottles, jugs, tubs, and lids (Rx bottles, cottage cheese, and salsa tubs).

### Lane County Community Plastics Collection

Starting in June 2022, #1 and #2 plastic bottles, jugs, and jars no larger than a tennis ball (no tubs) can go into curbside mixed recycling containers or can be taken to ANY Lane County transfer station. It's easy peasy; there's no need to remove any labels. However, this change still leaves out code #4 and #5 plastics and #2 tubs that can be collected by the community collectors and recycled through a special arrangement with Lane County Waste Management.

Also, lunch reservations are a commitment we make to the vendor – and therefore any no-shows are still responsible for paying for their lunch ticket.

# PUBLICLY FINANCED UNIVERSAL HEALTH CARE

*LWVUS supports the promotion of a health care system for the US that provides access to a basic level of quality care for all US residents and controls health care costs. (1993)*

*Members who wish to comment regarding the resolution to the Lane County Board of Commissioners see below.*

The current method of delivering health care to the people of this country is a hodgepodge of mixed methods. You have the Veterans Administration, Indian Health Service, Medicare, Medicaid, CHIP, and Health Insurance as amended by the Affordable Care Act.

The VA, HIS, CHIP, Medicare and Medicaid are all government funded either wholly or partially. Medicare is slowly coming under control by health insurance through the advantage plans. We have to ask why isn't the rest of the population funded by the government for our health care needs.

Most of us know by now many other countries have some sort of universal health care system in place that takes care of their people. And, the US spends twice as much and gets worse results than our counterparts.

By treating health care as a commodity in the market place, we are seeing dire outcomes and repercussions to our inequitable health outcomes. Commodities are something you go shopping for. Do you shop for diseases that you would like to get? No. What we end up shopping for is health insurance that we can afford that will hopefully cover what our needs are at the time. Or, we get the insurance that our employer offers us, which may not meet our needs either medically or financially.

The investment world in America is seeing a chance to profit from our health care needs. We are seeing mergers, acquisitions, and closures at an astronomical rate. Eugene has witnessed the results of Optum's (United Health's) acquisition of Oregon Medical Group: the loss of 31 doctors, closed clinics, and thousands of patients left without medical care in this last year while Optum acquired 11 Corvallis clinics. We witnessed Peace Health close the only emergency center in Eugene because they were losing money. Rep. Nathanson brought to Lane County

\$4.5M of taxpayer money in an attempt to bridge the gap of needed health care. One of those receivers of \$500,000 urgent care needs was BestMed owned by Community Care Partners, who has only one doctor and one nurse on their board and is owned by Shore Capital Partners, a private equity company out of Chicago.

We need public investment for people and their health care needs, not investment for profit. Representative Ben Bowman offered Corporate Practices of Medicine HB4130B, which Nathanson supports, to put clinics and hospitals back in the hands of medical providers. This will be raised again this session and needs our support.

We need to have representatives of organizations that care about people to be watchdogs, witnesses, and responders to the Universal Health Plan Governance Board and their Subcommittees. <https://www.oregon.gov/dcbh/uhp/uhp/pages/index.aspx>

The Public Health Advisory Committee approved the resolution yesterday. It will be presented to the Board of County Commissioners on Tuesday, November 12. We do not yet have the time for that presentation. Public comment related to the proposal will be at 9 am that day. You can come in person or sign up to provide comment online.





## LWVUS APPLAUDS ACTION TAKEN BY FEDERAL AGENCIES TO EXPAND ACCESS TO VOTER REGISTRATION

*President, Terry Parker recommends this press release updated September 18, 2024.*

WASHINGTON, DC – The League of Women Voters of the United States commends recent actions by several federal agencies under the Voting Access Executive Order which directs federal agencies to provide all eligible voters, regardless of political party, access to voter registration applications and reliable voter information when they engage with federal agencies. The actions announced by the US Department of Health and Human Services (HHS), the US Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) the General Services Administration (GSA), and Elections Assistance Commission (EAC) are taking a significant step toward strengthening our democracy.

By placing access to voter registration information within the federal application for health coverage, HHS and CMS, will not only simplify the voter registration process but also ensure that a broader segment of eligible voters, particularly those who may experience barriers to civic participation, have access to this critical civic information. This shift also reflects HHS and CMS recognition of the relationship between civic

participation and positive health outcomes. It will make it easier for citizens to take an active role in shaping their futures—both in terms of their health and their democratic participation.

Additionally, the modernizations to vote.gov that GSA and EAC announced will allow eligible voters in 46 states and the District of Columbia to fill out a voter registration application with only a few prompts. The new tool is also accessible for people with vision impairment, more user-friendly for all eligible Americans, and is available in 19 languages. The new feature is an important step as eligible voters register for this fall's election.

Every citizen should have a voice in our democracy, and we commend the work being done by HHS, CMS, GSA and the EAC to remove significant barriers that may have prevented eligible Americans from making their voices heard.
