SO MUCH KNOWLEDGE!

A main function of League Discussion Groups/ Units is to build individual and community knowledge in order to help us become better informed participants in our community.

In February there were opportunities to learn about services for the Latino/x/a/e community thru *Plaza De Nuestra Comunidad* and a housing-first approach for those struggling with homelessness, mental illness, cognitive disabilities, and chronic health problems provided by *Lane ShelterCare*. Attendees heard about effective approaches to working with those who hold differing views via *Braver Angels*, while Jimmy Schaper's research highlighted why Gen-Z experiences a different world that requires Old-Gen to adjust our approach to working together. Sometimes our focus is on a specific project such as the College Hill drinking water project, getting updates and answering questions.

REPRESENTATIVE FRAGALA - Biography from Oregon State Legislature Website

Representative Fragala has called Eugene, Oregon home for over 30 years and lives here with her husband, Tibor Bessko. Before being elected to the Oregon Legislature, she worked as an educator for over 25 years – first as an elementary classroom teacher and then at Pacific University's College of Education on teacher licensure and workforce development. Lisa served on the Lane Community College Board of Directors from 2018 until 2024, including serving as chair for two years during the COVID pandemic, and is passionate about Career and Technical Education. She was appointed as a member of the City of Eugene Planning Commission in 2017 and served until starting in the state legislature in 2025. As a member of the City of Eugene's Planning Commission, she helped to identify housing solutions for our community.

Lisa ran for the state legislature because as an elementary educator she saw first hand the struggles families face and because service in local government provided her with an understanding that it's possible

to make a difference. Lisa knows the most important issue for community members right now is affordability and the cost of living. This includes affordable housing, healthcare, and childcare as well as ensuring people have good paying jobs. She is honored at the opportunity to serve House District 8 in the Oregon State Legislature and is committed to making sure our community is a welcoming place for everyone to work, play, retire, and raise a family.

Representative Lisa Fragala was first elected in November 2024 and is currently serving in her first term as a state legislator in the Oregon House of Representatives. She is currently a member of the House Labor and Workforce Development Committee, the House Education Committee, and the House Housing and Homelessness Committee. She is also proud to have recently been appointed to the Oregon Women's Commission and to serve on the Higher Education Coordinating Commission Attainment Goals Workgroup.

On February 10, the LWVLC Unit meeting held monthly at the Springs at Greer Gardens, a senior living community, drew 15 people, including several newcomers. Addressing the topics of immigration and community organizing Marissa Elena Zarate, Co-Executive Director of plaza de Nuestra Comunidad, presented an excellent overview of her organization's broad mission in Lane County. Plaza offers programs in Adult Education, Recovery Services, Organic Gardening, Family Literacy, Business

WHAT'S HAPPENING WITH BALLOT MEASURES IN THE PRIMARY ELECTION? BY NANCY MILLS, VOTER SERVICE CHAIR

Often the ballot measures submitted for the primary election are low visibility ones - like levies for fire departments or schools - of great importance for the folks involved but less interesting for most of the voters. That is not the case this election.

There are two Lane County measures: a levy to fund the OSU extension program and its 4H activities, which is very important to the more rural areas, and the Watershed Bill of Rights, which declares that watersheds (rivers, lakes, aquifers) have the right to exist, flourish, and regenerate, and secures residents' rights to clean, unpolluted water. This latter measure seems like a no-brainer, who is not in favor of clean, unpolluted water, but it has surprising opponents.

There are important levy requests for the Eugene Library and for Willamalane Parks and Recreation. The proposed library levy includes more materials and programs for young readers plus two new kiosks. Willamalane's levy request will help stabilize costs as more services are requested. This is Willamalane's first levy request since 1944.

Other proposed measures from governing bodies in Lane County include one from Dexter RFD, school bond proposal from Siuslaw and proposed charter revisions for the City of Eugene.

There are measures from smaller organizations, like the Dexter RFD, a school bond from Siuslaw, and small charter revisions for the City of Eugene.

All of these measures are important because property taxes are increasingly failing to pay for needed services. At the same time, many families are struggling to pay for basic needs. So, it is important to have a good understanding of each ballot measure.

That is where you come in. Ballot measure explanations are written by League members who describe the measures in non-technical terminology and enhance the understanding of the measures by talking with proponents of the measures as well as those who see problems with them. Fun facts about Lane County: Lane County encompasses 4,620 square miles extending from the Pacific Ocean to the Cascades; ninety percent of the county is publicly or privately owned forest land; parts of three national forests and three rivers are located in Lane County; most of the population lives in Eugene and Springfield, the second largest urban area in Oregon; some of the remaining population live in ten smaller incorporated cities; a little more than a quarter of the county's population lives in rural, unincorporated areas.

The unit discussion materials for March will be a study discussing how public services are provided to the population in those rural areas. LWVLC has a position addressing urban services, and it is anticipated that this study will support a proposal for a position addressing rural services.

As discussed in detail in the study, services provided in the rural areas of Lane County are generally of the same type as those services provided to urban areas, with exceptions for municipal water, sewer, waste disposal, and fire services, which are not available in

all areas. Rural residents often must travel to urban areas to access many services, including health, housing, and social welfare services. While online services such as telehealth can reduce the need for travel, rural areas often lack access to broadband internet and cellular services, effectively precluding the use of such options. Two areas facing the most critical challenges in providing rural service relate to emergency response times and broadband and cellular access.

The Lane County Sheriff's Office (LCSO) employs only 0.19 deputies per 1,000, compared to comparable Oregon counties with 4.3 deputies per 1,000 residents, leading to emergency response times up to 45 minutes. It is estimated that \$22 million would be needed to bring the LCSO up to the state average for public safety services. The State of Oregon has begun key infrastructure projects with the goal of expanding digital access to all, but that work is still underway.

Until a way is found to increase public safety services and essential digital infrastructure is completed, rural residents will continue to experience a disproportionate burden compared to their urban counterparts.

LWVUS ALERT: Tell Congress to Oppose the SAVE Act Suite of Bills - from LWVUS

- Opposing all versions of the SAVE Act is a top priority for the League of Women Voters. Congress continues to introduce bills that would require voters to present documentary proof of citizenship (DPOC) to register and/or vote. In the 119th Congress, three major pieces of legislation have been introduced to require DPOC to vote, including:

- The ***Safeguard American Voter Eligibility (SAVE) Act*** passed the House in 2025 and would require citizenship documentation to register to vote, and, more recently
- The ***SAVE America Act*** and the ***Make Elections Great Again Act*** have even stricter components than the SAVE Act, like requirements for voters to present DPOC both at registration and the polls and for absentee ballots to be received by election day.

Collectively, we are referring to these pieces of legislation as the "SAVE Act suite of bills."

200 people attended this event and approximately half of these were non-members.

The total income generated from the \$5 reservation fee was \$1,168. Total expenditures (rental, food, etc.) were \$2,295 - so the total out of pocket expense was \$1,127.

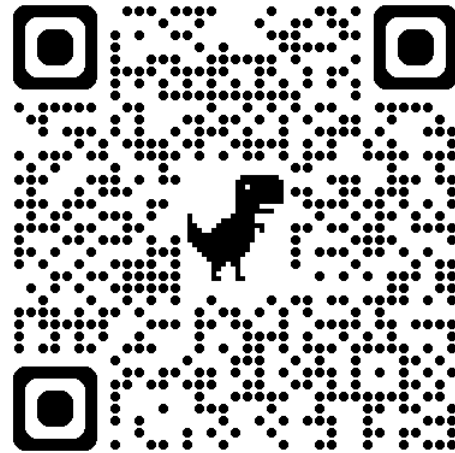

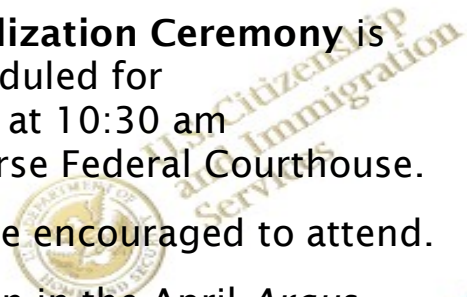

Oregon Delegates - 64th Annual United States Senate Youth Program

The United States Senate Youth Program has selected two outstanding Oregon high school students, **Ms. Isabella Luciana Baldisseri of Woodburn High School** and **Mr. Zev Gallagher Wacks of South Eugene High School**, to represent the state during the 64th annual Youth Senate Washington Week from March 7-14, 2026. They will join 104 student leaders across the nation for an intensive week-long study of the federal government, meeting with senators, the President, a Supreme Court Justice, and other high-level officials. Each delegate will also receive a \$10,000 college scholarship to support their academic pursuits in government, history, and public affairs. **Zev** is Student Body Vice President, has championed environmental justice, helped pass Oregon's climate education bill, and served on multiple youth councils. He is also active in voter registration efforts and leads various school and community organizations.

Congratulations to Zev! My wonderful debate partner and student government co-lead. He is also very

humble, so let me brag about him. Zev recently won the Jewish Federation of Lane County's Young Leader Award. He is Secretary of the Eugene Youth Advisory Council, was elected as President of the Senate for the 79th Oregon YMCA Youth and Government Legislative Assembly, and served the Oregon community and beyond as a Northwest Youth Corps volunteer. So proud of his representation of Oregon and all of his other achievements!



A FEW FURTHER FANTASTIC ACCOMPLISHMENTS

The annual Future First Citizen Award recognizes the academic success, civic engagement, and leadership skills of a high school senior in the Eugene, OR area. This award recognizes one student from each of the six high schools in Eugene and provides scholarships to all finalists and the winner.

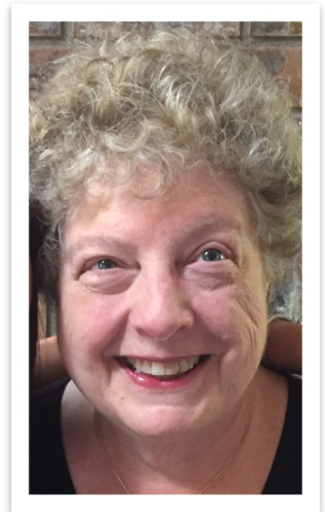
YMCA President's Advisory Council: Lily was appointed to and currently serves on the local Eugene Family YMCA's President's Advisory Council.
